Shoppach Family History subject of January meeting.

The Saline County History & Heritage Society began 2015 with a program presented by Marlo Bush Krueger on her family - the Shoppach Family- of Benton, Arkansas.

She mentioned Johann Wilhelm Schoppach I, John William Shoppach builder of the Shoppach house who lived from 1809 to 1861, and John Frederick Shoppach who served as Saline County Sheriff from 1880-1896.

Marlo, who serves as editor of the *Saline*, the quarterly of the Saline County History & Heritage Society, began with the family's German roots and followed them through until they came

to America. She also addressed the family's role in Saline County history.

A large crowd was in attendance at the program and enjoyed the presentation and power point.

J&B Book Bindery was March program at SCHHS.

Mr. John Machycek owner of J&B Book Bindery gave a very interesting program on preserving old books and family bibles. He said that the oldest book he had ever worked on was a French book from the 12th century.

He started J&B in 1977. He

estimated that his jobs are divided 50-50 between book repair and restoration and binding periodicals. Mr. Machycek has bound books for the Saline County Library and the society over the years.

He is one of the last book binderies in the area.



The 1918 Flu Epidemic in Saline County is focus of April 16th program at SCHHS

On April 16th the Saline County History & Heritage Society will present the program "The 1918 Flu Epidemic in Saline County." The program will begin at 7:00 pm at the SCHHS Research Center at 123 North Market Street in downtown Benton. Freddie Burton, former Saline County clerk; will present the program.

7,000 Arkansans died in this

epidemic and many from Saline County lost friends and loved ones.

"Fagan and Crawford:Saline County's Own" to be program on Thursday, May 21

Thursday, May 21 Steve Perdue will present "Fagan and Crawford: Saline County's Own" at 7:00 pm at the Saline County History & Heritage Society's Research Center and Archives at 123 North Market Street in Benton.

James Fleming Fagan was born in Kentucky, but his family moved to Arkansas in 1837 where his father worked on building the Old State House in Little Rock. His father later died and his mother Catherine married Samuel Adams who had been governor and later was state treasurer. They lived for a time in Clarksville, but in 1849 Samuel bought a farm in Saline County on the Saline River. Samuel later died and James took over his farm near Benton.

In 1861, the Civil War broke out and on the courthouse lawn, the Saline Guards were formed and they elected Fagan the captain. He eventually became a Major General. William Ayers Crawford was born in Tennessee and moved to Arkansas. Crawford enlisted in the Mexican War in Saline County. In 1852 he was elected Saline County sheriff, and in 1858 he was elected state representative from Saline County. In 1861 he joined the Saline Guards with Fagan. He rose from Lieutenant to Colonel in the war.

Fagan and Crawford were great friends and, in fact, in one letter Crawford wrote to his wife to tell her that Fagan had bought him a uniform with a cape and given it to him.

This program gives some insight into these two men that possibly has never been known before.
