
New Business Partners with Saline County History & Heritage Society Inc.

To Can the Kaiser: Arkansas and the Great War to be presented as an Arkansas Heritage Month Event Thursday, May 18th with Mike Polston

Mike Polston a former teacher at Cabot High School and the historian for the Encyclopedia of Arkansas wrote book on Arkansas in World War I. Your editor has known Mike for over thirty five years and he has been collecting World War I artifacts at least that long. He also began interviewing World War I veterans back in the 1980's and even interviewed my grandfather Jack Harvey Hogue in 1986.

He began a history museum at Cabot High School when he was teaching there and now that museum is one of the best in the state of Arkansas.

With his vast knowledge of World War I it was inevitable that he would put his knowledge in a book about World War I in Arkansas. In 2015 the book was published and he called it *To Can the Kaiser: Arkansas and the Great War.*

On Thursday, May 18th at 7:00 pm, Mike Polston will present his presentation at the Archives and Family Research Center located at 123 North Market Street in Downtown Benton.

May is Arkansas Heritage Month and the theme for this year is Arkansas in World War I.

Mike will have copies of his book for sale. It was edited by Mike and Guy Lancaster and published by Butler Center books.

In her presentation she mentioned the Revolutionary war soldiers buried in Saline County Asher Bagley in Old Union cemetery and Benjamin Bryant who is buried in Collegeville cemetery. She also talked about the different war memorials on the courthouse lawn. There are memorials to World War I dead, World War II dead, Korean War, Vietnam, Kuwait, Persian Gulf and Afghanistan -Iraq. The pavers list several thousand Saline County Veterans. Also Civil War markers were discussed, The program was well attended and many favorable remarks were made about the presentation. We thank Mrs. Coppock for a very interesting program.

The Camden Expedition Senic Trail Committee from the Arkansas Historic Preservation Department visited Benton on February 25. For the past year the committee has been visiting sites of the 1864 Camden expedition commanded by Union General Frederick Steele. The committee is developing a tour map for tourists for the Historic Preservation Department. The group has toured Malvern and Rockport, Praire De'Anne, Poison Springs, Camden, Marks Mill, Jenkins Ferry, Elkins Ferry, and other places along the route. Representatives are from Pulaski, Saline, Grant, Hot Spring, Clark, Nevada, Hempstead, Ouachita, and Cleveland counties. Steve Perdue serves on the committee from Saline County.

April program to be on the Sardis Community Hurricane Township and World War I soldiers

On Thursday, April 20th, Steve Perdue will present a program on the Sardis Community and Hurricane Township. The community of Sardis revolved around the two churches that were in the community. Pleasant Hill Baptist Church and Sardis Methodist Church were the two churches. Sardis had also at one time had a campground and many people in the area would come and camp out on the grounds and near a spring while a Revival meeting was held at the church. Baptist were also invited to attend the services and Methodist attended the services at the Baptist Church. Many young Sardis boys enlisted in World War I, Arle Hogue, Calvin Williams, and Paul Mashburn were among those who served. Yancy Hogue joined the army and was killed in World War I and was buried in France. Jack Hogue who was raised in the community also served in the army in World War I. Students attended the Sardis school and later the Bryant and Bauxite school districts took in many Sardis students.

The program begins at 7:00 pm. Make plans to attend.
